Meet Your Faculty

Dr. Kimberly Carter is entering her twentieth year on faculty at Radford University this year. She has promoted from Instructor through Full Professor, has earned tenure, and is a Full Graduate College Faculty. Two years ago she accepted the position of Director of the School of Nursing, having served as Associate Director for four years. She has a diploma in Nursing from Ohio Valley General Hospital School of Nursing, a BS in Nursing from Radford University and an MSN and PhD from the University of Virginia, with cognate work in Epidemiology at The Johns Hopkins University. Dr. Carter's clinical specialty is Community/Public Health, with an emphasis on health behavior and health promotion. Her research interests are the dimensions of health behavior with a variety of populations, including older adults, teenagers, young adults, and the homeless. She has received over \$600,000 to support 20 grant-funded projects as project director or co-director. She has published 20 peer-reviewed papers, in addition to instructor supplements, book contributions, and professional newspaper articles. She served on the Board of Review for Advances in Nursing Science, Journal of Advanced Nursing, and Public Health Nursing. Dr. Carter is the Research Coordinator for Lewis Gale Montgomery Regional Hospital and is a member of the Research Council for Carilion Clinic. She also serves on the Board of Directors for the Salem Research Institute, Roanoke Valley Allegheny Regional Advisory Council on Homelessness, Virginia Association of Colleges of Nursing, Workforce Council of the Virginia Rural Health Association, Leadership Task Group for the Virginia Regional Action Coalition, and the Nursing Advisory for Virginia Western Community College. She is a member of Sigma Theta Tau International, American Nurses Association, and Virginia Rural Health Association. She was a two-time Radford University nominee for the State Council for Higher Education in Virginia Outstanding Faculty Award, and she was the recipient of the 2008 Waldron College Outstanding Professor Award, the 2007 Ruth Spencer Dunfee Professional Achievement Award for the Ohio Valley General Hospital School of Nursing Alumni Association, and the 2006 Distinguished Alumni Award for St. Clairsville High School. She has been named in more than 20 Who's Who and International Biographical listings. Dr. Carter is a Fellow from the 2004 cohort of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing Leadership for Academic Nursing Program.

Dr. Carter is married to Greg Carter, also an RU alum (Geology, 1986), who is Senior Environment and Safety Specialist at ITT Night Vision. They have two children, Leanna (15) and Brandon (11). They live in Franklin County, where they enjoy tennis, boating, sailing, swimming, and hiking. They attend Epworth United Methodist Church, where Dr. Carter is a part-time pianist.

Dr. Sarah Strauss has been a member of RU's SON faculty full-time for the last 12 years. Prior to this she served as an adjunct faculty after leaving VCU SON in 1996. Dr. Strauss was involved in development of the Ph.D. program at VCU. Her specialty is pediatrics and she is a certified FNP. At Radford Dr. Strauss teaches undergraduate Nursing of Children, Advanced Health Assessment, Advanced Family Nursing IV, Children's Health, and Capstone in the DNP program. She received her BSN from the University of Texas Medical Branch-Galveston and her MN in Pediatrics from the University of Florida in Gainesville. Dr. Strauss's work experience includes staff nursing in pediatric oncology at M.D. Anderson Hospital (Texas) and adult health at Virginia Mason Hospital (Seattle), and faculty at Western Carolina University in addition to VCU and RU faculty appointments. Dr. Strauss has also practiced as an NP, part-time health department NP (Roanoke/Alleghany Health District), and faculty practice, Radford University Clinics. Her current practice at the Free Clinic of NRV serves uninsured and underinsured children and adolescents. She performs daycare, school entry, & athletic physical exams, and employment/CDL examinations for Head Start workers. Dr. Strauss was awarded Medical Volunteer of the Year by the Free Clinic of NRV for 2008 and Nurse Educator of the Year in 2011 by the Virginia Council of Nurse Practitioners.

Notes from the Director

This August we celebrate the completion of the first year of the DNP, while at the same time two of our students will celebrate their completion of RU School of Nursing DNP program. The graduation of our first two DNP students — Dr. DeEtta Compton and Dr. Faye Lyons - is a significant milestone in Radford University history, as they are the first students at Radford University to earn a doctoral degree. This is a shared accomplishment for both Dr. Compton and Dr. Lyons, as well as for the doctoral faculty who conceptualized, designed, developed, and implemented the DNP for Radford University. Many words come to mind to describe what it has taken for both faculty and students to arrive at this historical moment: vision, dedication, persistence, patience, flexibility, innovation, and excellence are but a few.

Achievement of a doctoral degree demonstrates a person's ability to navigate a complex and challenging system successfully, while concurrently showcasing their ability to be a significant contributor to the science and practice of nursing. Nursing faculty provided innovative and accessible education, modeled scholarship, and mentored the students to make the very rapid transformation from Master's to doctoral level practice and scholarship. Both DNP alums have established the foundation for their career of scholarly contributions for improved practice and optimal patient care. Dr. Compton's work in cardiac care and Dr. Lyon's development of skin lesion treatment decision trees for publication represent significant advances for best practices in the clinical setting. We are proud for the School of Nursing to be leading the way for other Radford University programs who will follow with graduates of doctoral programs. We are hopeful that the national vision for the DNP will reveal new solutions for our healthcare system, and we are confident that our first two DNP alumni as well as those who will follow will be the nurses who discover innovations and use their scientific knowledge and practice expertise to assure quality patient outcomes.

It is truly your 'moment in time' to work directly with the gifted faculty here at RU and to make your goals become a reality. These are some of the highlights of what is being accomplished by your fellow students.

Linda Davis has been busy developing pod casts on "Falls and the Older Adult". A series of 7-8 are planned for distribution and will be part of a new CE component that will be initiated at the RUSON. Linda worked with me and Kathy Kleppin (IT Education Specialist). She has

submitted an abstract for presentation to the Virginia Nurses Association (VNA) education day in the fall and will give a lecture to undergraduates in NURS 444.

The use of IT and Simulation kept Ellen Harvey busy this semester. She worked at the Carilion Center for Experiential Learning where she applied, through much guidance from Dr. Echols, the Simulation Module for Assessment of Resident **Targeted Events** (SMARTER) and eventbased approach to training (EBAT) methodology to scenario development and training for research application. She has had a poster accepted for presentation for the Rising Star Sigma Theta Tau conference in October 2011. She is working on an article for publication and will soon deliver a lecture in Dr. Scheckler's IT elective course for graduate students. This fall she will continue to address simulation education and also work at the Carilion Center on Aging with Dr. Jill Bass. Joni Goldwasser has had experiences at the **Veterans Administration** Central Office (VACO) in DC with Dr. James Harris. a Deputy Director. She investigated/researched major documents that provided a review of the literature on independent practice of NPs. A major project is anticipated, as a result of her efforts, to write position statements for NPs in the VA system. This will have a significant impact on federal supremacy and licensed independent practice (LIP) with the VA system. She will continue to work with Dr. Harris and others on this project. While at VACO she edited the first nursing services handbook for the entire VA system. She also gave an expert (I was told) respiratory lecture in the DNP Chronic Illness class this summer for Dr. Tony Ramsey. Joni spent time at the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) in DC, with Dr. Joan Stanley and Kathy McGuinn addressing Master's Essentials. She will work directly with them to develop a tool kit for use with he Essentials

on the Future of Nursing into this report. Joni has had a poster accepted for the DNP program in New Orleans this fall.

Kim Hall completed the following projects during her residency: completed requirements for Advanced **Practice Certified Wound** Care Nurse; prepared manuscript for publication entitled "Preventing Pressure Ulcers in Long-Term Care: Implementing a Nurse-Driven Interventions Protocol"; prepared manuscript for publication entitled "Is an Advanced Practice Nurse a Smart Addition to Your Wound Care Team?"

How exciting to see these things occur with our DNP students. We began one year ago and have come a very long distance in scholarship. All those agencies working directly with our students are very proud of their work and have evaluated them highly. I am truly have humbled to have facilitated some of these student projects.
