

COMS 326 Nov. 12-26 Assignment

It is difficult to get substantial work done in our 50 minute class sessions. Therefore, instead of Friday class Nov. 16 before Thanksgiving break, complete this "lab" assignment in any university lab at any time during the week. It is not a "day off" to extend your (or my) vacation. I will be in the lab from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. on Friday to answer questions and help with problems.

Assignment: Update your final project proposal page to outline your project. These lists can be tentative for now, and can change as you work on the site. Please follow steps 1, 2 and 3 before leaving town for Thanksgiving, and complete steps 4 and 5 before returning from the break:

1. Make a list of the pages you plan to create
2. Make a list of the likely images that will be on the pages (even if you haven't shot, created or found them yet)
3. Say whether there will be video on the site, or other special features.
4. Describe the general layout of the pages or include a thumbnail or "wireframe" sketch done with Photoshop -- or a photo of a pencil-and-paper sketch.
(Go back to the Dreamweaver Classroom in a Book discussion of planning the "GreenStart" site for a discussion of this kind of site planning. For an excellent discussion of "wireframing" as a tool when working with a team project, see the Web Style Guide:

5. After completing the reading and planning mentioned below, add a paragraph to your final-proposal page saying whether you plan to "Mirror" your site on an external server, or "Supplement" your site with an external blog, template or CMS-based site as described on the Web Hosting page.
