Office of Undergraduate Research & Scholarship Invites Student Summer Research and Creative Inquiry Proposals

The Office of Undergraduate Research & Scholarship (OURS) is now inviting proposals from Radford University and RUC students in all disciplines for the Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF) program. All currently enrolled, degree seeking undergraduate students who will graduate after the fall 2025 semester are eligible to apply. Awards are for a \$6,000 stipend to the student recipient, \$1500 stipend to the faculty mentor and a small supply budget.

Applications must be completed and submitted by midnight Wednesday, February 19, 2025. The expectation is that students will work under a faculty mentor to complete the proposed project for 10 weeks during the summer. The faculty mentor should help plan the project, assist with proposal development, and actively participate in the implementation of a student's project. Biweekly professional development meetings will be held virtually to support and celebrate the participating students.

# Citizen Leader Program – Restructure Spring 2025

The transition, starting this semester will be led by Dr. David Beach, <u>dbeach6@radford.edu</u>, the Director of Undergraduate Curriculum. Dr. Jean Mistele, long-time director of the program, has been consulting with him, and the Citizen Leader board members may continue in their role as advisors if they so choose.

Dr. Mistele will fill the recently vacated Faculty Fellow position in the Graduate Affairs Office. From Dr. Mistele: "I want everyone who has worked with me across campus to know how much I appreciate each of you for your support. Most of all, I appreciate all the new friendships that developed over the last 6 years, which were most enjoyable."

# Update from the General Education Improvement Task Force

The General Education Improvement Task Force continues to work on a draft model for a GE program. Last week, faculty should have received the draft mission and values statements, program goals and learning outcomes, and structure. Last week, the Task Force developed an architecture for assessment, and next week will develop an implementation timeline. Earlier this week, representatives from the Registrar's Office, Advising, IT, and the Provost's Office met to start discussing details of implementation and budgetary implications.

#### Social Determinants of Health Lunch and Learn Series

On behalf of the Waldron College Equity Committee, I invite you to participate in our upcoming Lunch-and-Learn session, *Social Determinants of Health for Older Women*. The session will be led by Dr. Diane Hodge of the School of Social Work and held via <u>Zoom</u> on **Thursday, January 30 from**12:00 – 1:00 pm. No advance registration is required. Students are also welcomed, so please share this invitation with anyone who may be interested.

#### **Event Summary**:

In the context of social determinants of health (economic stability, education, healthcare, environment, social context, physical environment, etc.), we will discuss unique and specific social factors that affect older women's mental/physical health through statistics and information available. Social factors are often interwoven and complex. For example, the historical gender bias and lack of funding in research has left post-menopausal women with little information on chronic conditions and treatments. How do we break this cycle? The majority of our time will be spent discussing what healthcare professionals can do to support better health outcomes for older women.

#### **Spring 2025 Interprofessional Case Study Event**

The 2025 Waldron Interprofessional Case Study event will bring together students from various health and human services disciplines to foster collaboration and enhance interprofessional communication. Participants will work in small groups to tackle a fictional yet realistic scenario, discussing the roles and responsibilities of each profession involved in the care of a complex patient case. The event promotes critical skills such as teamwork, empathy, and cultural competence, with the goal of preparing students to work effectively in interdisciplinary teams to improve patient outcomes. This bi-annual activity is an integral part of Waldron College's commitment to interprofessional education and helps students understand how their diverse skill sets contribute to comprehensive, patient-centered care.

In Fall of 2021, faculty in Philosophy and Political Science started the Wicked Festival. In the intervening years, it has grown from 100 to 500+ students per semester, showcasing faculty and students from six of Radford's colleges.

The Festival's secret sauce is that students make themselves experts on complex (wicked) public problems, they work to find solutions to the problems, and they present their solutions in public

where they are the authorities on their issue. Students report their conversations with other students are empowering. The feedback they receive at the festival from faculty and fellow students enables them to improve their final solutions.

Over the last few years, we have found the Festival builds important skills like teamwork, communication, leadership, and critical thinking. Unbeknownst to me when we started, it was also building confidence, hope, empathy, and public-mindedness too. Further, the Wicked initiative points us in new directions for the future of higher education. If "the answer" is freely available on ChatGPT, where is the university's value added? We have found wicked teaching is a great way to add value to our students' undergraduate experience and their career/citizen futures.



If getting students to find solutions to complex public problems might fit with your teaching, I invite you to join the Wicked Festival this semester or this year. Classes join the festival under their instructor. All students in the class can participate in the festival or a selected group. The festival exists to support faculty and their learning goals for their students.
