Message from Provost Usher

Congratulations! We graduated over 1300 students last week (~1000 undergraduates and over 300 graduate students). I love that we are community that comes together to celebrate our students and the end of the academic year, and that so many of our faculty and staff volunteer to help out as marshalls, readers, bagpipers, program distributers, picture-takers, and general support. And then many of you then came back to campus to finish projects, attend CITL's Our Turn, and get ready for summer. I appreciate all you are doing, and hope that summer, in whatever form it takes for you, gives you the best balance of relaxation and productivity.

In recent weeks, we have gotten a couple of accolades I wanted to pass along. The Carnegie Foundation and American Council on Education released Radford's new Institutional Classifications. It now has two classifications, Institutional and Student Access. Based on size, program mix, and award level focus, Radford is Professions-focused Undergraduate/Graduate-Master's Large/Medium. In the Student Access and Earnings Classification, Radford is listed an Opportunity College and University, with higher access and higher earnings. This is the most coveted rank (at least in my mind), and only three public universities in Virginia earned it.

And, thanks to overwhelming support from the community, Radford University is the 2025 Top Adventure College, as designated by Blue Ridge Outdoors! We know that every day is an adventure (we hope that's a good thing), but now the world will know it.

Beyond the adventurous kayaking, hiking, biking, and hanging out at Selu (look for open events during the summer), Academic Affairs will be searching for three positions over the summer: Assistant Provost for Graduate Studies, Assistant Vice President for Health Sciences, and Assistant Vice President for Radford Online. Thank you to everyone who has already agreed to serve on these search committees - I'm finalizing the list and will include it in the next Threads. The finalists will have public presentations with Zoom options for each of these positions, and we will include these in Threads over the summer.

Late in the semester, we unfortunately had the "Shelter in Place" experience because of an off-campus incident. As a campus, we handled this very well. President's Cabinet works with Radford University Police on "table-top" exercises where we practice our emergency procedures, and that experience paid off. But, we realized that the messaging was confusing to many, so Chief Plummer has offered to host several faculty training meetings in August before the semester begins.
