





## Free Hearing Screenings for Faculty, Staff, and Students

The Radford University Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders is offering free hearing screenings to faculty, staff, and students during the Fall 2025 semester. Available appointment times are **Tuesdays between 11:00 am-12:30 pm and Thursdays between 1:00-2:30 pm.** Each appointment will be about 10 minutes long.

Hearing screenings are a shortened form of an evaluation and while they can determine the potential presence of hearing loss, they do not quantify severity of any hearing impairment.

**Please Note:** These screenings serve as important clinical education experiences and provide student clinicians with mandated hours and experience toward fulfilling licensure requirements to practice as speech-language pathologists. Please keep your appointment or notify the clinic as soon as possible if you are unable to do so. Failure to keep an appointment hinders a students' ability to develop necessary clinical skills needed for graduation and licensure.

that you have access to a collection of digital medical and health sciences books? Included in the Radford University Libraries' almost 300 databases, <u>AccessMedicine</u> (requires your Radford University login) contains medical textbooks, examination and procedural videos, patient safety modules, practice guidelines, self-assessments, customizable patient education, and many other visual health sciences related tools and resources. This database has applications for a variety of health science fields, or for just general use and reference.

In this one-hour session, Cultivating Foundation Relationships, the presenter will discuss key differences between foundation and federal funders, introduce a foundation taxonomy to help participants quickly categorize foundation funders during the prospecting process, and offer a networking strategy to guide outreach to foundations. The presentation will emphasize the importance of internal coordination prior to engaging foundation funders and the benefits of a long-term relational approach. The Interdisciplinary Research Team Project Development Award aims to foster collaborative, cross-discipline research and scholarly activity in the following focus areas: Healthcare (e.g., health disparities, rural health, mental health, healthcare education), Artificial Intelligence (AI), Community workforce training that boosts economic development, as well as Community engagement promoting cultural heritage, tourism, and the arts

- Enable teams to conduct smaller projects/studies that may impact the university and/or aid the community, collect preliminary data/information for external funding proposals, Federal earmarked proposals, or other allied initiatives

#### **GLOBAL FACULTY FELLOW**

The McGlothlin Center for Global Education and Engagement (MCGEE) seek applications for one faculty to serve as a Global Faculty Fellow. The selected faculty will assist with increasing the level of engagement of RU faculty in international initiatives, including promoting faculty-led programs, assisting with the development of institutional partnerships, identifying international research opportunities, and others. The faculty will be designated to serve a 2-year term.

The Global Faculty Fellow will be expected to contribute by:

- Engaging with Deans, Academic Chairs and other faculty members to promote and build awareness of the international initiatives available to the faculty at their respective College.
- Participating in faculty events to create awareness about international opportunities for academic collaborations.
- Delivering at least four (4) workshops during the academic year on how to develop international academic collaborations.
- Researching two (2) grant opportunities and identifying the requirements needed to apply.

The Global Faculty Fellow will become especially involved with international education at Radford University, thus gaining a balanced understanding of (1) the challenges facing international students at Radford University that may affect their retention, (2) the challenges and opportunities in establishing international collaborations, (3) the education abroad opportunities (including research) available for Radford University students and its role in the retention of students, and (4) a general understanding of the most important U.S. immigration regulations that govern international students on campus.

In recognition of their service, the Global Faculty Fellow will receive a \$2,500 stipend per year.

All candidates for the Global Faculty Fellow appointment are expected to have the following qualifications:

- Must be in a 9-month faculty contract.
- Tenured or tenure-track faculty status.
- Strong interest and/or experience with international education.
- Willingness to interact with people from the broad spectrum of the campus community (students, faculty, administration, staff, prospective students and their families, and alumni)

Those interested in applying to be a Global Faculty Fellow are encouraged to review the McGlothlin

<u>Center for Global Education and Engagement website</u>. Application materials should include the following information:

- A 1-page cover letter that addresses the applicant's:
- experience with or interest in international education.
- goals for contributing to the international office.
- Curriculum vitae
- Brief memos from one's department chair and one's dean that indicate the faculty member would be permitted to serve as a fellow if selected.

Applications should be submitted to <u>ibetancourtvelez@radford.edu</u> no later than November 15, 2025. The appointment is expected to being on January 12, 2026.
