Mary Dickerson Presents....

Mary Dickerson, a sociology major, presented her research at the 30th annual SouthEastern Undergraduate Sociology Symposium (SEUSS) at Emory University in Atlanta, GA on



February 25th, 2012. As noted on the Emory University Department of Sociology website, SEUSS provides an opportunity for students to present their original research papers in a professional atmosphere. Mary's research presentation,

Musical Preferences, Consumption, and the Internet examines the processes that contribute to individu-

als' music preferences. Although a considerable body of sociological research examines the cultural and network factors that influence individuals' preferences for various types of music, Mary notes that neither of these perspectives considers how the emergence of the internet as an important mode of consumption may change how people learn about and de-

velop preferences. Mary argues that the internet may broaden individuals' music preferences by providing individuals with access to and information about music genres with which they are unfamiliar. The results of Mary's research indicate internet use does influence individuals' music preferences. Importantly, Mary finds that internet use does not automatically broaden individuals' music preferences. Rather, the way individuals use the internet influences how the internet shapes individuals' music preferences.

MENTORs

This semester eight sociology majors are teaching and mentoring students at Floyd County High School in the Place-Based Education Oral History Project. They are taking SOCY 493 Practicum in Sociology, which counts for their in-



ternship/experience major requirement. The sociology majors teach workshops in qualitative research methods and mentor high school students who do oral history interviews with Floyd County elders.
