1. What is Academic Advising

a. High School versus College

Academic Advisors are here to help you! We are a resource for you from now until you graduate. If you have a question and you're not sure where to go, your advising center would be a great place to start.

High School

Advising Meetings

• Your counselor will likely schedule the appointment for you, plan the agenda, and do most of the talking.

Class Schedule

- Counselors tell you what classes would be best to take. Most of your classes are assigned to you.
- Your parents, teacher, and counselors' opinions have a big impact on your decisions, and they play a big role in helping you know your responsibilities.

Reasons for Meeting with your Counselor

• You may only see your counselor once a semester, and mainly about scheduling or college preparation.

College

Advising Meetings

• You are in charge of scheduling your appointment, creating the agenda, and will do most of the talking.

Class Schedule

- Academic Advisors help you choose your own classes, and develop a strategic academic plan. You are typically in charge of registering for all of your classes.
- While parents and family still play an important role, it is up to you to take responsibility to
 make decisions and take initiative if you want academic support, access to resources, or
 information on how to get involved.

Reasons for Meeting with your Advisor

 You will meet with your Academic Advisor throughout the semester for planning course registration, discussing progress in courses and addressing academic and/or social concerns. Meet with your Academic Advisor <u>immediately</u> for assistance if anything occurs that may affect your academic success. Your Academic Advisor can make referrals to other office such as tutoring/coaching, counseling, and other student support resources.

b. Advising Centers

At Quest, you will meet the Academic Advisors from your college. If you are not sure which college your major belongs to, don't worry, you will find out at Quest. There are 7 advising centers on Radford's campus:

2. Quest Advising a. How to Prepare for Quest Advising

The Radford Professional Advisors Present: How to Prepare for Quest Advising

Here are 4 ways to be prepare

- 1. Make sure you know your Radford username and password
 - You will need to login to the Radford system to sign-up for fall classes during Quest. Make sure you can get into your account before you arrive.
- 2. Make sure you pick the right major when you sign-up for Quest
 - That also includes Major Exploration. If you need to update your major, go to the Orientation icon on MyRU (it looks like a compass) and update your registration. You can also contact the Office of New Student and Family Programs.
- 3. Make sure Radford has all of your transcripts
 - The advisors will need to know what classes you've already completed, before we can help you pick new classes for fall. Make sure you know what you've taken, if you passed, and send a copy of your most up-to-date transcripts.
- 4. Make sure Radford has all of your SAT/ACT, AP, and IB test scores
 - You may have earned credit for a class based on your test score. So, we'll need the test scores to figure out the best fall classes for you to take.

Completing this course is a great start

Reviewing all of the information in this course is a great first step to preparing for Quest! The more you do to prepare for Quest, the easier it will be when you arrive. Then you can just focus on meeting new people and having fun while you're here.

b. Possible College Credit

At Quest you'll discuss any possible college credit that you're expecting to receive with an advisor.

• Advanced Placement (AP) courses:

 AP test results need to be sent to the Radford Admissions Office to be evaluated for credit. You can request scores through <u>College Board</u>. For score requirements see the Admissions section of the <u>Academic Catalog</u> (the Advanced Placement and College Level Exam Program section).

International Baccalaureate (IB) courses:

 IB test scores must be sent to the Radford University Admissions Office and evaluated for credit. You can request scores through the <u>International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO)</u>. For score requirements see the Admissions section of the <u>Academic Catalog</u> (the International Baccalaureate Policy section).

• Dual Enrollment (DE) courses:

 For DE credit to be awarded, an official transcript from the community college where the course was taken must be evaluated by the Radford University Admissions Office. A high school transcript showing the grade for the course is not sufficient.

• Other Transfer Credit:

- <u>Virginia Community Colleges</u> You can review the <u>VCCS Transfer Guide</u> to see equivalences for courses taken at Virginia Community Colleges. An official transcript from the community college must be evaluated by the Radford Admissions Office to receive credit.
- Other Universities and out-of-state schools Courses completed at other accredited higher education institutions can be considered for transfer credit. To receive credit for these courses an official transcript must be sent from the institution to the Radford University Admissions Office and the courses must be evaluated by Radford University officials to determine credit. Only courses passed with a grade of C or higher will be considered for transfer credit.

At Quest:

The advisors should have a copy of your transcripts, however, we may not have the most up-to-date version. That means it's important for you to come prepared to talk about which courses you've taken, if you completed the required exam (for AP and IB), and your expected grade for the course or score for the exam.

Remember to send all of your transcripts and scores to the Radford Admissions Office as **soon as possible.** You will not receive credit for courses until your official transcripts and scores have been received.

Bring questions to Quest to discuss with an advisor.

c. How to Change Your Major

Before Quest

- Log into MyRU
- Select the Orientation icon (it looks like a compass)
- Change your selected major in your Quest registration account
- Contact the office of New Student and Family Programs if you need help

At Quest

- There will be a table at check-in to change your major
- You can tell your Quest Assistant at any point
- During the advising time, you can tell an advisor if you want to change your major, double major, or add a minor

After Quest

- You will need to complete a Declaration of Major/Minor Form
- Contact your advising center to start the process

d. What to Expect in Advising at Quest

What to expect during Advising and Registration at Quest

Advising Time:

- You'll be divided into groups based on major, including Major Exploration
- You'll meet with advisors, professors, and students to learn about your major and Radford policies
- You'll make a plan for fall classes. This is also the time to talk about possible transfer credit and the Core Curriculum (general education classes)

Registration:

- We'll help you register for classes at Quest
- We'll teach you how to find resources on MyRU and the Radford website
- You'll be pre-registered for a few classes before you arrive, but we'll make changes and finish adding classes during registration

e. Class Adjustments After Quest

Schedule Changes

• You will not be able to make changes to your schedule until the class add/drop period begins

Class Add/Drop

- Freshmen must go to their academic advising center to change classes. Changes can be made starting on Monday, August 26 at 8:00 am and ending on Friday, August 30 at 5:00 pm
- Transfers, who have attended Quest, can change classes online tentatively starting on Saturday, August 24 at 5:00 pm and ending on Sunday, September 1 at 11:59 pm

Class Withdrawal

- This policy allows students to stop taking a class that they have not finished and take a grade of W
- A class withdrawal does not affect your GPA and may only be used between certain dates each semester (roughly the 2nd week of classes through the 10th week)
- You can use up to 5 class withdrawals during your time at Radford

3. Checklist to Prepare for Quest and Fall

Things to Do:

- 1. Make sure you complete this module

- 4. Send final transcripts from your high school to Radford University
- 5. Send any Dual Enrollment transcripts from the community college
- 6. Contact College Board to send any AP (Advanced Placement) scores
- 7. Make sure your major is correct in the Quest registration program
- 8. Bring an unofficial copy of all of your transcripts

4. MyRU

The MyRU portal provides access to many single-sign-on systems for students, faculty, staff, and alumni. This section will tell you a little more about some of the icons on MyRU

a. Check-in

The check-in process asks you to confirm that you are indeed going to attend RU this term and to verify or update your contact and emergency contact information.

Check-in is available two weeks before classes start

The check-in process is required of all students in order to:

- Receive financial aid funds for the term.
- View your course schedule.
- Make schedule adjustments.
- View midterm and final grades.

To access the student check-in process:

- 1. Log into the MyRU portal.
- 2. Click on the Check In icon.
- 3. Follow the instructions.

b. Desire 2 Learn (D2L)

Desire 2 Learn is an integrated learning platform designed to create a single place online for instructors and students to interact, either for a completely online course or as a supplement to a face-to-face course.

c. Duo Two-Factor

Once you enable two-factor authentication on your Radford University account, you will be asked to identify yourself with a device after you enter your usual username and password. The device may be a smartphone or tablet using the duo app, or a text message to a phone, or an automated voice call to landline or cell phones. <u>Click for more infol</u>

d. Academics

This icon gives you access to course registration, the degree audit, various campus resources, and allows you to order your Radford academic transcript

e. Starfish

Instructors use Starfish to provide students with preferred contact information and feedback on their course.

Academic Advisors use Starfish to view and record advising notes, set their appointment availability, and provide students feedback on their academic progress.

f. Handshake

Handshake is a platform that connects talented Highlanders with internships, jobs, and career opportunities.

g. RU Involved

RU Involved provides student with information to become actively involved with RU's more than 250 clubs and organizations, service events, and other campus programs.
