Peace Studies Minor

Students minoring in Peace Studies design their programs of study in consultation with a Peace Studies faculty advisor. The program is administered by the Peace Studies faculty who must approve all programs of study.

Students will choose a concentration that will help them in shaping a course of study with a clearly stated focus (the courses selected will be justified in terms of that concentration). Concentrations include: human rights; environmental peace, development, and sustainability; healing and well-being; conflict analysis, transformation, and peacebuilding; world order and just peace; as well as a Create Your Own concentration based on a student's interests (student will work with advisor to craft the specifics of this concentration and what courses will fill it).

Required and Elective Courses

The minor consists of a minimum of 16 semester hours. Many courses within existing university departmental curricula are potentially relevant to the minor, and it is the responsibility of the student to design a program (in consultation with Peace Studies faculty) based on his or her own interests and field of specialization prior to submission of the program to the Peace Studies faculty for approval.

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A minimum of seven hours of the minor must be devoted to three required courses (students may take all five of the PEAC classes if they wish) :

PEAC 200 (required)

One of the following three courses (3 credit hours required) Students may take more than one of the courses. **PEAC 280**

PEAC 498 (this Independent Study may be taken as part of the Study Abroad Experience) PEAC 300

<u>PEAC 499</u> (required) Students will prepare (under the direction of a Peace Studies faculty mentor) a Senior Portfolio of work produced in courses taken for the minor, show how they are all thematically connected, and prepare a public presentation of these examples of work.

Any additional credit hours needed to reach the 16 credit hours required for the minor will be made up of courses from other university departments that support the chosen concentration, selected by the student in consultation with the faculty mentor or the Director of Peace Studies. Courses taken for other majors or minors may be counted toward this minor.

Students complete a Program of Studies, listing the courses they plan to take; the Director of the Peace Studies Program must approve the Program of Studies.

Through the lens of peace, students look at different aspects of global, national, local, interpersonal, and intrapersonal topics to note where and why conflicts exist. Students will describe the behaviors, beliefs, that are the underpinnings to cultures, social
	 institutions and environments that result in these conflicts. The Peace Studies Minor capstone consists of the following: Students focus on a theme relating to peace (examples: Human Rights; Trauma, Care, and Well-being; Environmental Peace, Development, and Sustainability; World Order and Just Peace; Create Your Own)

	 From that theme students form a question they want to answer. (Examples: Theme- Trauma, Care and Well-being; Question: How can we better help veterans in this country? Theme: Human Rights and Trauma Care, and Well-being; Question: How does being African American in this country negatively impact one's Well- being?)
	 Students then identify three courses outside of Peace Studies that will help to inform them and provide background to help them conceptualize/answer their theme and question. This is where They describe behaviors, beliefs, cultures, social institutions, and or environments.
	 4. Students have to write a reflection paper on how the course relates to their them and question. They need to describe how different aspects of society impacts their topic. <u>They submit three different</u> <u>reflective papers one for each course.</u> By describing behaviors, beliefs, cultures, social institutions and environments, these papers are to demonstrate that students are knowledgeable regarding the context of their problem in relation to society as well as the globally (If a student is looking at African Americans and counseling they need to examine race relating to gender, class, power structures and other aspects of society). These Reflection papers will count as the two assessments for Learning Outcome 1
	 5. Students will then analyze the interactions of behaviors, beliefs, cultures, social institutions, and environments by viewing their problem using the lens of the Peace Studies courses they will have taken. (Example: after learning about Veterans students will look at Introduction to Mindfulness and examine how that concept might improve dealing with Trauma, Care and Well-being?) Students will be developing three reflections analyzing each course using information they learned from the peace studies classes to create solutions on how to further the cause of peace in the topic they have chosen. These Reflection papers will count as the two assessments for Learning Outcome 2 6. Students put together an in-depth website/portfolio with these and other elements. 7. These portfolios are presented to Peace Studies Minor Students and Faculty.
